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Harry's Roadside Shop





Taylors Island Annual Wool Pickup

A perfect day; calm seas, light cloud cover, and a hearty crew. This year's wool pick up went off without a hitch. In the early days, our local islands, Boston, Thistle, Louth, Wedge, Revesby, Spilsby, and Grindal, all had sheep grazing operations, with permanent families on the larger islands. Their wool was picked up by the local ketch fleet and delivered to Adelaide. With the demise of the ketch fleet, the farmers were forced to acquire their own fleet of barges and crafts.

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When Tacoma visited Port Fairy, Tacoma was joined by Tim Phillips and his historic 1920s fishing vessel, the Storm Bay. Tim accompanied us on our Flinders Island adventure in the rock lobster boat, the Jane Kerr. Tim is now planning another adventure to motor around Australia with a flotilla of 7 boats. They are due in Port Lincoln in late February and plan to stay two weeks before departing to cross the Bight. Tacoma is scheduled to host the group in a raft up seafood event. Should be a good show.





Taylor and Boston are the only islands still stocking sheep, while the other islands have been developed as luxury resorts or housing developments, with some 70 homes being built on various islands. The bigger islands have air strips, while others have been absorbed into the National Park system.



News of the Berth

There is good news about the proposed community pontoon next to the Fishermen's Memorial in Lincoln Cove Marina. The council is preparing a specification brief and potential contractors list, and it is likely a funding model will be firmed up after Christmas. The proposed location will allow us to offer easy access to the tourist population and enable us to overcome the issue we have with tide at our current berth.

Tuna Competition and Riveria Cruise

The two events, the Tuna Competition and the Riveria Cruise, provide the opportunity to showcase Tacoma to a wider audience. The tuna competition will take place on March 15th, and the Riveria Cruise on 8th March 2025.

During the tuna competition, we act as a mother ship, providing a platform for the Saturday night get together, with about 40 guests. Our guests are fed a spaghetti and meatball dinner after a long day at sea. Tacoma will provide the service of an on-water backpacker hostel for crews of the smaller boats that do not have onboard accommodation.

The Riviera Cruise attracts over 30 vessels. During the years, we have acted as a gourmet display table, a nightclub with a live band, and seafood filleting platform. This year, the plans are still being developed. We are attempting to change the format; it could be a Pirate Night, a sea shanty singalong, or a "catch it and we cook it" event - all will be revealed in our summer newsletter.



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
